Since March, 2015, Michael Ramage has worked part-time as the Deputy General Counsel at the Institute for Intergovernmental Research (IIR) in Tallahassee, Florida. The IIR is a Florida-based nonprofit corporation specializing in criminal justice, homeland security, and juvenile justice issues including, but not limited to, information sharing initiatives, criminal justice training, and anti-gang Initiatives.
